



Selected 2011 Census data on cultural and linguistic diversity in WA

South Perth Local Government Area

According to the 2011 Census, the South Perth LGA has a total population of **40,739** people:

- 35.6% were born overseas
- 21.9% were born in a non-main English speaking (NMES) country
- 20.3% speak a language other than English at home.

Ancestry is calculated as:
 (Total – Not Stated = Fixed Figure).

Percentages are calculated by dividing each variable by the fixed figure, consistent with ABS methodology.
