



Selected 2011 Census data on cultural and linguistic diversity in WA

Ngaanyatjarraku Local Government Area

According to the 2011 Census, the Ngaanyatjarraku LGA has a total population of **1,563** people:

- 1.9% were born overseas
- approximately 0.4% were born in a non-main English speaking (NMES) country
- 76.8% speak a language other than English at home.

Ancestry is calculated as:
 (Total – Not Stated = Fixed Figure).

Percentages are calculated by dividing each variable by the fixed figure, consistent with ABS methodology.
